



Every student deserves to be safe in school

No one should be harassed or bullied. No one should fear walking through the halls. But it happens...Establishing strong anti-harassment policies and procedures sends the message that bullying is unacceptable. The Dignity in All Schools Act (DASA) is a law that, if implemented, would prohibit harassment, making schools more accountable and allowing students to reach their fullest potential.

A little history...

Mayor Bloomberg refuses to implement DASA. The bill was passed by the City Council in 2004 and vetoed by Bloomberg immediately after. DASA was then re-passed with an overwhelming majority in the Council. Bloomberg's unwillingness to implement this law has real dangerous consequences to the lives of young people in New York City.

what we're gonna do:

The New York Civil Liberties Union is writing a report on Mayor Bloomberg's denial of DASA and the effect it has on NYC students. It will include stories from young people who have faced harassment and bullying in their schools. Youth narratives are integral to put pressure on Mayor Bloomberg and Chancellor Joel Klein to show them the danger of ignoring such an important law.

Nationally 65 percent of teens have been harassed or assaulted during the past year because of their appearance or their perceived or actual gender, sexual orientation, ethnicity, race, disability, gender expression, or religion.
